

THE PASTOR'S PEN January 3, 2021



In Matthew 24:9, 10, Jesus said regarding the latter times, ⁹ "Then they will deliver you up to tribulation and kill you, and you will be hated by all nations for My name's sake. ¹⁰ And then many will be offended, will betray one another, and will hate one another.

Jesus shared that in the latter times – like where we are today in 2021 – people will not desire to hear the truth. Lies will be considered truth and truth will be considered lies. Individuals are lifting up and highlighting "Alternative Facts" as a replacement to facts and truth. Individuals in positions of leadership and authority bend, distort and twist the truth to the degree that the truth is not noticeable, and many are blindly following those individuals, believing if they said it, it must be true.

Those who speak the truth – the real truth, are hated, despised and presented and the enemy. Strategic efforts are made to shut them up and shut them down, no matter the costs.

As all of this is occurring, Jesus declares that *many will be offended*. In the 1st Century, those offended from the inside were the family members of those who had converted to Christianity. "How dare you give up you Jewish teaching for this new thing called Christianity?" Families were offended and ostracized those who had become Christians while considering them no longer a part of the family.

Those offended from the outside was the Roman government and its sympathizers. The Emperor Nero persecuted Christians for enjoyment and sport. We have heard the stories of the Christians who were brought to the colosseum and lions were released on them while Nero and others cheered. It is also recorded that Nero set Christians on fire at night to illuminate his gardens.

The internal and external offense resulted in the persecution of the Christians living in the 1st Century.

We understand, likewise, that when we be who we are and do who we are, we will offend those on the inside and outside of the church. We also understand that when those on the inside and outside of the church are offended, we can expect to be persecuted.

For the month of January, we will explore through Jesus' ministry what it means to offend those who are in opposition to the fulfillment of God's Kingdom her on earth. No, it is not our desire to be offensive, however, when we be who we are and do who we are, we will offend some.

In a very real way, the world needs offending, which is why the world need you...
