WHY EDUCATION AND THE ACCURATE TEACHING OF OUR HISTORY MATTERS

To believe that is it appropriate for someone to rewrite, revise and/or reframe another person's history to fit into that person's viewpoint is the height of arrogance and perceived superiority.

History is defined by the Miriam-Webster's Dictionary as, "a chronological record of significant events (such as those affecting a nation or institution) often including an explanation of their causes." Additionally, The Cambridge Dictionary defines history, "(the study of or a record of) past events considered together, especially events of a particular period, country, or subject:" Note that nowhere in the definitions does it state, suggest or imply anything regarding how the study of history should make one should feel. The study of history is not about how someone should feel about the events that took place in the past. It is about the review and study of the events that occurred in the past with a consideration of what was beneficial and, therefore, should be reinforced and what was detrimental and, therefore, should be resolved never to happen again.

The study of Black History in Florida and several other states has been more about sanitizing the horrific, inhumane and immoral events of the past to ensure that young, White boys and girls do not learn how horrible, inhumane and immoral their ancestors were. If that were the goal of studying history, they would be perfectly positioned to accomplish the goal of protecting young, White boys and girls. However, again, that is not the goal of studying history.

Even more, if the goal of history is to protect young, White girls and boys, what about young, Black and Brown girls and boys? What about their feelings? Who is protecting them? What about their needs. How do they receive an accurate view of their ancestors and the realities of what they overcame amid the horrific, inhumane and immoral things that were done to them?

How will they discover that they have steel in their spines to stand strong against the forces that come against them if the books that share those stories are banned from their libraries?

How will they discern that that something that they feel on the inside that keeps pushing them forward through their challenges is a fire that was placed in their bellies by their ancestors who struggled through life-defeating and life-depleting challenges more than any other people in the history of humanity if those stories are in books that are illegal to open to them?

How will they develop the ability to listen to the "voice of the genuine in themselves"¹ if they are denied the right to know who they genuinely are because they are denied access to the trials and triumphs of their ancestors, not only on the continent of North America, also and more importantly, on the continent of Africa?

Today, there is a new form of white privilege emerging that involves banning any books, canceling any courses and classes, and curbing any public dialogue to shield themselves and their children from any opinion or historical fact that might "disturb or hurt their feelings."

God forbid that any white people in this generation of Americans should be forced to face how this nation stole land from Native Americans, and then stole and enslaved people from Africa to work that stolen land. The argument is that being exposed to those lessons might hurt the feelings of some white people or leave them feeling guilty about the actions of their ancestors.
